## Volunteer & Club Reminders:

### Annual Volunteer Training Requirements

The Ohio State University and Ohio 4-H requires all volunteers to attend annual training.

Yearly Volunteer Training Requirements (2-hour min.)

- County Updates (1 Hr.)
- Youth Activities & Program Policy (formerly known as Policy. 1.50) (approx. 25 mins)
- Competency Training – (30 mins)

We are currently working on a training list and will be sending that out with trainings starting in January.

To better help us plan volunteer training, we would appreciate feedback on last year's training. While there's a lot that cannot be adjusted on training, there are some things we have flexibility on. We want to hear from you on how we can improve the experience!

### New Volunteer Process

All new 4-H volunteers must complete the approval process before beginning their volunteer service. 4-H volunteers include club advisors, Junior Fair superintendents and others who might have "care, custody or control" of 4-H members.

Huron County 4-H will take volunteers from November 1, 2024 – April 1, 2025. All items in the process must be completed by April 1, 2025. Otherwise, the prospective volunteer will have to wait until November 1, 2025, to apply and go through the process. This process includes:

1. New Volunteer Application
2. Review References on Application
3. Interview with 4-H Educator
4. Fingerprint Background Check
5. Attend New Volunteer Training
6. Attend Annual Volunteer Training
7. Receiving denial or approval letter

There were several volunteers in 2024 that started the process and did not complete or failed to complete by April 1. Therefore, they were never granted volunteer status. Completing the process does not automatically grant volunteer status. You must receive an acceptance letter from OSU Extension notifying you of approval. If you are acting as a volunteer before receiving the letter, there will be repercussions.

### Volunteer Fingerprint Rescreening Notices Sent

All 4-H volunteers who need to be fingerprinted to remain a volunteer in 2025 will receive a notice and instructions. Letters went in the mail this week. Fingerprinting must be completed by February 15, 2025, to maintain your volunteer status. All 4-H volunteers will be rescreened within a four-year period (and every four years after that). Failure to rescreen will result in removal as a volunteer.



### Club Enrollment Procedure for 2025



All 4-H clubs must complete the annual club enrollment process. All clubs have already adopted the required constitution. Items that will be required for 2025:

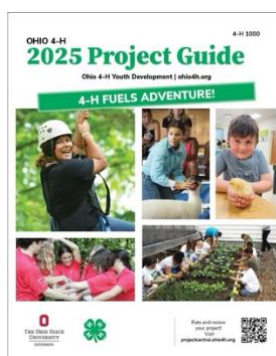
- Club Charter Checklist
- Club Planned Program of Work
- Financial Summary Report for 2024 (This report may be submitted online or in paper form). A form will be sent to Organizational Advisors near the end of the year.

Club 990 E-postcards will be filed by the Extension Office to meet the IRS annual reporting requirement.

### Livestock Sale Checks Expire in Mid-November

Members who sold livestock at the county fair and turned in thank you letters received their sale check in late September. All livestock sale checks will become invalid in mid-November. The cost is \$10 to have an expired check reissued.

### End of the Year Internal Club Treasury Audits



Each club should elect or appoint an audit committee of two advisors and two members from at least two different families to serve as the audit committee.

No one on the audit committee should be an authorized signer on the banking accounts or related to the treasurer.

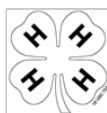
The committee needs to look over the check register, see that it has been reconciled to the bank statements, and examine the receipts supporting the checks written during the year. They then report their findings back to the club at a regular meeting and fill out the Yearly Audit Certificate on the last page of the Treasurer's Manual.

The Yearly Summary Report, also on the last page, should be completed each year. The treasurer should complete the Summary Report prior to the internal audit being conducted. The Secretary's Manual and Treasurer's Manual should become a part of the club's permanent records, along with the News Reporter's records.

### Not Too Soon to Think About 4-H in 2025

Club enrollment packets will not be ready to pick up until January 31. However, advisor teams should meet before that to do some initial club planning for 2025. Advisors need to set tentative meeting schedules, discuss the duties for which each advisor will be responsible and set some advisor goals for the club. A little time spent now can set the stage for a great year!

### Voluntary Membership Fee Becoming Mandatory in 2025



Many clubs supported our 4-H program again this year with a voluntary \$5.00 per member fee or a flat amount donation.

These funds are earmarked strictly for 4-H program use and really help to supplement our tight budget. Most of the money goes to program supplies.

In 2025 we will be making the voluntary membership fee mandatory.

What the money will go towards –

- American Income Life Accident Insurance coverage for all 4-H members & clubs
- App Membership Fee
- Program Supplies & Materials
- Miscellaneous 4-H Expenses

### Important Non-Discrimination Reminder

We do not discriminate within our 4-H program.

- If a club's by-laws prevent a member from rejoining for specific reasons (ex. Incomplete project or didn't fulfill specific club requirements), that member may be told they need to find a different club. That member is, however, still welcome to be a 4-H member, just in a different club.
- If a club's by-laws set a maximum number of members, only allows siblings of current members to join, or only accepts certain projects (ex. horses), etc. then potential members who don't meet the criteria may be told they need to find a different club. Refer them to the Extension Office if they need help finding a club. We have a brochure that lists all the 4-H clubs in Huron County.
- It is NEVER okay for clubs to vote on whether to allow a member to join!

### Changes for 2025 Get Fair Board Approval



Proposals for changes from the evaluation meetings were given to the Senior Fair Board to review. All changes that impact the Junior Fair must be approved by the Senior Fair

### Honor Club Materials Due by November 15

2024 Honor Club materials are due in the Extension Office by 4:30 p.m. on Friday, November 15. Clubs must apply to become an Honor Club. Honor Club may be submitted by paper form or electronic form. Both can be found on the website under club resources.

### Huron County 4-H Camp Dates

Huron County 4-H Camp dates have been set. After careful consideration the following are dates for 2025:

Intermediate Camp June 3-6  
Junior Camp June 9-12  
Cloverbuds June 13

We understand that Western Reserve students are still in school a few days the week of Intermediate Camp. We have spoken with Western Reserve's superintendent - Students who attend camp will be excused as long as they maintain good attendance and stay caught up on academics, and the parents alert the school promptly for necessary arrangements.

### 2025 Huron County Livestock Dates

The following dates have already been established for the 2025 4-H year. Dates are subject to change and additional dates may be added.

- May 15 – Livestock ownership deadline
- May 17 – Feeder calf tagging & vaccination
- June 21 – Ohio State Fair entries due

- July 15 – Rabbit tattooing
- July 14-18 – Horses at the State Fair
- July 23-August 3 – Ohio State Fair
- August 10 – Livestock enters the fair
- August 11-16 – Huron County Fair
- August 17 – Projects released 8 a.m.-noon
- December 6, 2025 – Cattle weigh-in and tagging

### Cattle Weigh-in and Tagging on December 7, 2024

December Weigh-in & Tagging is Saturday, December 7, 2024, from 8:00 a.m. -10:00 a.m. at the Huron County Fairgrounds in the Doug Wilson Building. All market cattle will be tagged with EID tags.

Cattle that already have EID tags are not required to attend tagging but are required to upload information on 4-H Online by Dec 7. Cattle choosing not to come, will not be eligible for rate of gain. Instructions for upload:

- Market cattle must be owned, without horns and on feed by December 1, 2024. All males must be castrated.
- Cattle must be haltered for weigh-in and tagging.
- A maximum of four beef animals (any combination of beef steers and beef heifers) and/or four dairy steers per exhibitor may be weighed and tagged. However, only two beef market animals (any combination of beef steers & beef heifers), two dairy steers and/or one beef carcass animal may be exhibited at the fair.
- Exhibitors must call the Extension Office immediately if a tag comes out to have the animal retagged.

### Cattle Bred, Born & Raised in Huron County

The Huron County Cattlemen have a program to recognize market cattle and beef feeders at the county fair that are bred, born, and raised in Huron County. Exhibitors with eligible cattle that are tagged in on December 7 will be given a qualification card to fill out and return to the Extension Office by January 15. Beef feeder exhibitors will receive their verification form on May 17 and must return the signed form by May 31. Exhibitors with qualified market cattle, who turn in the verification form, must declare at the fair in which division the animal will be shown. Beef feeder calves with a qualified verification form will automatically show in the Bred, Born & Raised division. The breeder must be a member of HCC when the calf is conceived and when the calf is shown.

Applications for the 2025 National 4-H Conference are open now at <https://go.osu.edu/N4HC>. Youth must be aged 15-18 as of 1/1/2025 and enrolled as a current Ohio 4-H member to apply. Applications are due Dec. 1, 2024, at 11:59 p.m.

### State Fair Cattle Identification Protocols

The Ohio State Fair Beef Department has protocols for identifying market beef animals. These protocols include the use of an electronic identification (EID) ear tag that has a unique 15-digit number and a DNA hair sample that must be submitted for all market beef animals, including crossbred heifers, that exhibitors plan to enter in the 2025 Ohio State Fair Junior Market Beef Show. The DNA envelope must be signed by an Extension professional for 4-H entries or the FFA advisor for FFA entries.

DNA collection will be in the form of a hair sample that will be submitted to the Ohio State Fair by January 15, 2025. Along with the DNA hair submission, each market animal's 15-digit EID tag must also be included on the DNA packet. A few DNA packets will be available at tagging. Cattle will be tagged with EID tags this year at tagging. This will cover the Ohio State Fair EID tag Requirement and the BEST show EID tag requirement.

Filing a DNA packet does not constitute a state fair entry. Actual entry must be made online by June 21.

### [Explore Maine's Aquaculture Industry with Virtual Field Trips from Maine 4-H](#)

Virtual Field Trips (VFTs) are an innovative way for youth to explore and learn about places and people that would otherwise be infeasible! These immersive, online experiences bring Maine's thriving aquaculture industry to life—no travel required. Accessible at no cost, the Virtual Field Trips are designed to break down geographical and financial barriers, making high-quality, hands-on learning available to all. Register online to receive a link to the VFTs. Each field trip also comes with complimentary 4-H activity guides and lesson plans to help facilitate meaningful engagement with youth. The first VFT currently available features the University of Maine's Center for Cooperative Aquaculture Research (CCAR), a large-scale, land-based aquaculture facility in Franklin, Maine. Additional virtual field trips are in development and will be rolled out throughout 2025 and 2026. These experiences offer insight into seafood production, workforce development, career exploration, and STEM concepts related to aquaculture technologies.

### [President's Environmental Youth Award](#)

Encourage youth with an existing environmental stewardship project or an idea for a project to apply so that their achievements can be further recognized. The President's Environmental Youth Award (PEYA) recognizes outstanding environmental stewardship projects developed by K-12 youth. The PEYA program promotes awareness of our nation's natural resources and encourages positive community involvement.

Youth must have completed their project while they were in kindergarten through the 12<sup>th</sup> grade and the project must be sponsored by an adult who is 21 or older. Applicants from all 50 states as well as U.S. territories are eligible to compete for a national Presidential award.
